

Rector's Pastoral Letter

Some of you may have enjoyed watching the sky of Northampton when Northampton Hot Air Balloon Festival dotted the sky with colourful hot air balloons from dawn to dusk a few weeks ago. My family and I absolutely loved watching them floating away silently and yet delightfully. The boys were absolutely thrilled when they saw some of them waving to us as we waved to them.

In our modern world with social media, smartphones and instant news notifications, sometimes I feel being part of this never-ending race to see whose voice is the loudest or whose news is the fastest. Looking up the sky and watching those hot air ballons made me ask myself: How often do I stop and look up the sky and appreciate it? How often do I stay in silence to appreciate the blessings that God has given to us, his presence and love?

What a great blessing that those hot air balloons brought! I don't know if the organisers thought of any spiritual




impact of their work, but I certainly appreciated it in that way and I know I wasn't the only one.

I would like to share the conversation I had with a young man about the event. His name is Liam. He is one of the operators who sits behind the screen on Sundays' live-streamed services. He is a very talented and reliable operator and a valuable member of the church family. One of his hobbies is hot air balloons. He was actually on one of those hot air ballons that you may have seen.

Liam told me about the similarity between journeys in faith and journeys in hot air balloons.

"Once you are in the balloon, you are completely dependent on the wind. Yes, you can control how high you go up but you have no propulsion other than the wind. So you have got to work together with the wind" said Liam.



"So how do you land then? How can you safely land the balloon if you don't

have total control over its journey?" I asked.

"You should read the wind so you would know when's the right time to go up and when's the right time to go down. Then you can see the right spot opening up for you to land" he answered.

"How true this is for life and for faith as well as for hot air balloons!" I said.

"Yes, there are a lot of similarities. There is definitely something spiritual" smiles Liam as he nods.

I was really impressed and inspired by

our conversations. Sometimes we wish we had more control over our journey in life and in faith. However what we need may not be more control or more power but faith to see where God is leading us, knowing that we too are dependent on the wind, the movement and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

After a short break of August, this
September is going to be another busy
month as it was with June and July. In July
we spent 6 weeks discerning where God is
calling us to be as we mark the 800th
anniversary. In September, we are going to
renew our dedication towards God's
mission through our Celebration Service.
We will discern how we may be part of
God's Kingdom through an 8-week sermon
series: Kingdom Life. There are many other
events such as Songs of 800 years, Family
Music Talents Afternoon, Special talks and
many more. And we have to remember



that we are dependent on the wind of God. Instead of forcing ourselves flat out, we have to learn to trust and discern faithfully where that wind is taking us and how high or how low we should adjust our altitude to work together with that wind. Then as Liam put it, we will see the right spot opening for us where we can share our stories, testimonies, joys and hopes with others on earth.

Adventures of a Curate

One of the gifts of curacy is being able to experience ministry in different settings. Some time ago, I covered Sunday services at Holy Sepulchre and St Michael's, and both were great opportunities to preside in a different setting. I have recently covered a service at St John the Baptist in Kingsthorpe and conducted a wedding at St Andrew's, Old.

On every occasion I have arrived and been greeted by a helpful Churchwarden who has been eager to make sure I have what I need. When I ask how the service usually runs, the answer has always been along the lines of "we just do it the normal way," and so I have been learning just how varied 'normal' can be!

These opportunities have not only been a chance to worship in different places, with different people, but have caused me to reflect on my own practices when leading; helping me to identify the elements of leading worship that feel natural, and those that require a bit more energy. In all, they have been rich and helpful experiences.

I also had the opportunity for an experience of a very different kind as I headed off to do a three day placement at the Chapel Gym in Corby. The gym has a remarkable story, beginning with a disused church in the centre of Corby which was reimagined thanks to the input of Revd. Paul Frost (Parish Priest at St John's, Corby) and Chris – a man with a rather colourful past who turned his life



around after coming to faith following a spell in prison. Chris had connections with the Corby gym scene and together with Paul they transformed the old church into a new, well equipped, affordable gym.

I was eager to see the kind of faith encounters that could happen in such a place and what I found was a safe and welcoming space with a great sense of community that offered support, friendship and spiritual encouragement — whether it was a young, isolated and anxiety filled young person, or the Women's Institute come to improve their physical resilience. A good deal of time was spent sitting behind the reception desk drinking tea and chatting to the team, but when I wasn't doing that, I got stuck in to help with a bit of painting that needed doing! This was a good vantage point from which to see the diversity of people using the gym and get a real sense of the connections that were being built between them.

The Chapel Gym offers free three month membership to prison leavers, reduced rates to those on benefits, and works hard to overcome the obstacles that stop people being a part of their community. They are currently working towards providing accommodation for those in need through the purchase of a

house which can be used by a local charity to help people restart their lives. I sometimes wonder what church looks like outside the walls of our church buildings, and although the gym is in a church building it is most definitely identified as a gym. But there is a real ministry here; no robes, or hymns, or Eucharist, but compassion, encouragement and a welcome for all. I left feeling that I had experienced church in the community in a unique way and whilst it might not be a setting I come across again, I am glad I was able to be there.

I had hoped to tell you about another very different placement at Peterborough Cathedral, but Covid had other plans! My placement has been rearranged for the end of August, so perhaps I can tell you about that in next month's newsletter!

Each week at church we pray for people in need and also for schools, colleges and universities attended by our young people, as well as places of employment, where members of the church family work.


